





















































I. L. Allison (Sept. 1907), Flight Sub-Lieutenant. H.M.S. No. 3 Naval Squadron, attached 10th Wing R.F.C. Missing after offensive patrol March 18th, 1918, and reported in German newspapers as killed.

J. W. Andrews (May 1913), Pte. Inns of Court O.T.C. Kicked fatally by a horse in Tidworth Camp, Sept. 28th, 1917.

J. E. Aston (Jan. 1912), Pte. 22nd Battn. Royal Fusiliers. Killed in Action in France,

W. E. Barrs (June 1902), Bombadier, 101st Howitzer Battery (Australian). Killed in Action in France, July 21st, 1917.

R. L. Bell (May 1905), Lieut., M.C., West Yorks, Regt. Killed in Action in Syria. W. Bottomley (Sept. 1907), Cpl., D.S.M., Royal Naval Division, Royal Engineers. Died at Wareham Military Hospital, Nov. 15th, 1918.

J. Bourn (April 1904), Lieut., 1st N. Staffs. Regt. Killed in Action at Klien Zillibeke,

July 31st, 1917. I. D. Boyce (Sept. 1899), Sergt., 11th Royal Berks. Regt. Died of Wounds in C.C. Station, Aug. 16th, 1916.

E. R. Breckell (May 1899), Lieut., South Lancs. Regt. Died of Wounds received in France, Feb. 8th, 1918.

H. M. Adeock (Jan. 1902), Captain, 10th Lancs. Fusiliers. Killed in action at the Battle of the Somme, July 5th, 1916.

G. M. Allison (Sept. 1899), Captain,

Royal Welsh Fusiliers.

J. K. Allison (Sept. 1907), Lieut., 7th Lancashire Fusiliers. Wounded in France Oct. 9th, 1917 and Sept. 27th, 1918.

J. L. Allison (Sept. 1907), Flight Sub-Lieut., H.M.S. No. 3 Naval Squadron. attached 10th wing R.F.C. Reported missing after an offensive patrol; killed on the same date according to German newspapers. His Flight Commander wrote:—" Your son was missing on March 18th. He left with four other pilots on an offensive patrol at 10 a.m., and an hour later met the enemy scouts. A fierce fight resulted, in which our boys brought down two enemy machines. This occurred some distance behind the lines, and all the combatants were so interested that they were unable to watch one another. It was only when they finally assembled that your son was noticed to be missing. Nothing more is known by the boys who were with him..... I am so sorry your son did not remain with us for he was a wonderful flyer and had proved himself to be a very brave and efficient war pilot during the enemy offensive in the Somme Battle, March, 1918."

J. W. Alston (Sept. 1907), Corporal, Queen's Westminsters. Went to France carly in 1916 with the Machine Gun Coy. After a few months went to Salonika and remained there until the Armistice.

P. M. Anderton (Jan. 1897). Rifleman, 1/16 London Regt. Enlisted in 8th Northumberland Fusiliers and went to France, April, 1917. Was wounded near Ypres, August, 1917. In hospital and convales-cent camp in England for seven months, returning to France in March, 1918, in 1/16th London Regt (1st Oueen's Westminster Rifles).

O. Anderton (April 1904), Corporal, 9th Detachment Canadian Ordnance Corps. Enlisted July, 1915 in Fort Garry Horse, afterwards transferred to Ordnance Corps and put on draft for Siberia, which

was cancelled at Armistice.

J. W. Andrews (May, 1913), Pte., Inns of Court O.T.C. Enlisted in Inns of Court O.T.C., and was sent to Berkhamstead with mounted detachment 5th Cavalry Reserve, and while here met with an accident which proved fatal. When the accident occurred he was holding two horses. One of them, before he was aware, bit the one in front which lashed out and kicked him. He underwent a serious operation the following day, but peritonitis had set in and he passed away the next day, 11-30, Sept. 29th, 1917. He was admired by all his comrades in the army and many letters were written by them to Mrs. Andrews. His Captain wrote :- "Your son laid down his life for his country just as much as if he had fallen in France, and whatever yearnings he may leave behind, he at least is supremely and eternally happy." A chum of his wrote:
—"He was admired for the matter of course way in which he knelt to pray, and went to Communion every Sunday, although it often meant missing breakfast after being on duty all night." He was just about to enter an Officer's Cadet Batt, when the fatal accident occurred.

W. N. Anthony (May, 1906), Pte., No. 2 Tunnelling Company, Canadian Ex.

F. C. Armstrong (Sept. 1890), Chaplain to Forces, 16th Infantry American Army.

J. V. Armstrong (Sept. 1908), Pte., 130th Field Ambulance. Enlisted May, 1915. Served as Stretcher Bearer. I. E. Ashton (Sept. 1898), Pte., Royal

Army Medical Corps.

J. E. Aston (Jan. 1912), Pte., 22nd Batt. Royal Fusiliers. Killed in Action Feb. 18th, 1917.

J. R. Atkinson (Jan. 1910), Sergeant, Royal Army Service Corps. Enlisted 1914.

C. S. Attwood (May, 1905), Captain, 4th Battn. Essex Regt. Gazetted 2nd Lieut, in Territorial Forces 1912. Served

in Gallipoli, Egypt, Palestine.

C. F. Austin (May, 1897), 2nd Lieut. Royal Field Artillery. Enlisted August 30th, 1914 in Warwickshire Yeomanry, and was later promoted Sergeant. Was gazetted 2nd Lieut, Dec. 1916 in R.G.A. Served in Gallipoli, Egypt, France.

F. G. Baker (May, 1897), Sergt., 10th Canadian Inf. Battn. Served in France

1916-17. Once gassed.

N. B. Baker (May, 1907), Lieut., M.C. Machine Gun Corps, 7th Battn. Awarded Military Cross in 1917. Served in France and Italy.

R. H. Ballard (Feb. 1904), Pte., Honourable Artillery Company. Enlisted August 1914. Was sent to France Dec. 31st, 1914. He was killed on June 16th, 1915, when the H.A.C. took a leading part in the capture of three lines of German trenches at Hooge. His Company Captain and Platoon Sergt. paid tributes to his bravery, efficiency and popularity.

J. S. F. Barclay (May, 1911), Cadet, Royal Air Force. Enlisted in Artists' Rifles and later transferred to R.A.F.

C. L. T. Barclay (Jan. 1913), Lieut., Durham Light Infantry. Gazetted 2nd Lieut. in D.L.I. On account of motor accident was transferred to Labour Corps as Lieut. In the latter he was sent with the Italian Ex. Force, Acting Captain.

A. B. Barfield (May, 1893), Pte., Royal Army Medical Corps.

G. F. Barlow (Sept. 1910), Lieut., B/170th Brigade, Royal Field Artillery. Enlisted August 6th, 1914 in Cheshire Territorial Artillery, serving with this unit in Egypt. Obtained commission in R.G.A. March, 1915, and then served three years in France. Has been granted a permanent commission.

L. C. Barnes (May, 1905), Lieut., 7th Battn. Northumberland Fusiliers. Gazetted 2nd Lieut. August 25th, 1915. Wounded at Messines, August 5th, 1916, resulting in elbow joint being excised.

H. Baron (Sept. 1895), Lieut., Army Ordnance Department.

F. O. Baron (Jan. 1900), Lieut., M.C., 5th South Lancs. Regt., attached to London Rangers. Seriously wounded at Battle of Arras, April 9th, 1917. Awarded Military Cross. Latterly on Staff of British Delegation, Peace Conference. Hotel Majestic, Paris.

E. Baron (May, 1902), Captain, 16th Lancashire Fusiliers.

J. A. Baron (Oct. 1907), 3rd Air Mechanic Royal Air Force. Died of Pneumonia at Avlesbury Military Hospital, Oct. 16th, 1918.

A. W. Barr (Jan. 1907). Served in H.M. Transport Service.

L. J. Barrett (May, 1917), Flight-Cadet, Royal Air Force.

W. E. Barrs (June, 1902), Bombadier, 101st Howitzer Battery, Australian Forces. Enlisted Sept. 1914. Served in Gallipoli and Egypt. Owing to fever was sent to Australia for voyage, and on return was sent to France, where he was killed July 21st, 1917.

H. W. Bateman (May, 1895), Writer, Royal Navy. Served on H.M.S. "Fishguard."

R. N. Bates (Jan. 1912), 2nd Lieut., 3rd Manchester Regt. With Army of Occupation at Bonn.

P. J. Beech (Sept. 1902), Corporal, Motor Transport Company, R.A.S.C. Service in France and at Salonika.

E. Beech (Sept. 1912), Pte., 1st Royal Welsh Fusiliers. Enlisted May, 1918. Service in France, Salonika and Italy.

R. L. Bell (May, 1905), Lieut., M.C., Hampshire Regt. Enlisted in West Yorks and went to France 1915. Took part in Battles of Ypres, Somme, Lens, gaining his commission in the field. Was gazetted to the Hampshires on August 22nd, 1917. and sailed for Egypt in October. He was awarded the Military Cross for "conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty whilst with a party constructing roads. From a hill in front of him sudden bursts of enemy rifle fire made him apprenhensive for a party of sappers working on the enemy side of the hill. He collected some of his men, took them at the double towards the plain, spotted the enemy, and by rapid fire and a bayonet charge dispersed them." About a fortnight later he was killed in action in Syria.

W. L. Bennet (April, 1910), Lieut., 6th South Staffs. Regt. Enlisted Nov. 3rd, 1914, in 6th Warwicks. Granted commission Sept. 11th, 1915.

J. M. Benoy (Sept. 1905). C. G. Benstead (April, 1910), Captain, M.C., Tank Corps. Enlisted Sept. 1915. Commissioned July, 1916. Served in France with 8th Battn, London Regt, and later with Tank Corps. Awarded the Military Cross June 3rd, 1918. Gazetted Capt. Sept. 1st. 1918.

H. Betteridge (Sept. 1914), Cadet, Royal Air Force. Enlisted Aug. 13th, 1918. Stationed at No. 7 Observer's School of Aeronautics, Bath.

S. Bevis (Jan. 1897), Company Sergt.-Major. Awarded Military Medal.

F. Billington (April, 1904), S/S Major, A.S.C. Enlisted Aug. 7th, 1914 as Pte. in 16th Lancers. Was discharged Dec. 1915. Joined up again Jan. 1917 in A.S.C. Forage Dept. and became S/S Major.

A. M. Birch (Oct. 1907), Gunner, Royal

Field Artillery.

W. V. Birchall (Jan. 1910), Pte., M.M., K.S.L.I. Enlisted Oct. 21st, 1914. Awarded Military Medal Mar. 25th, 1918 at Cressy during the big offensive. Was twice wounded.

J. N. Blackwell (Jan. 1911), 2nd Lieut.

4th Indian Lancers.

J. C. Blakey (Jan. 1907), Corporal, R.A.S.C. Motor Transport, 283rd Siege Battery. Enlisted Aug. 1915. France Oct. 1915.

R. Blantern (Sept. 1901), Lieut, Tank Corps. Enlisted Oct. 1914 in Shropshire Yeomanry. Transferred to Tank Corps July, 1917. Wounded in France Aug. oth.

1918.

Masses of earth, some of whch must have weighed several tons, were thrown into the air. The gallant Sergeant was unfortunately buried beneath this avalanche, but the German front line at that point was blown to pieces and many of the enemy were killed."

T. Winfield (May 1907), Staff-Sergt.-Major, Royal Army Service Corps. Enlisted Aug. 1914. Was appointed Sergt.-Instructor and embarked as S.S.M. for the Dardanelles May 1015. After eighteen months service in the East he came to France and was attached to Artists' Rifles

I. F. Woodall (Sept. 1912), Lieut. M.C., Machine Gun Corps. Killed in Action at Wadi Hesi, Palestine, Nov. 8th, 1917. Awarded Military Cross 1916. Wounded in France 1916. Capt. Williamson writes: "We started off early one morning in the highest of spirits . . . and after a very long march up the seashore past Gaza arrived at the Wadi Hesi just at dusk. We attacked immediately and drove the enemy from his strong position. I then detailed your son to take his guns up to the outpost line and consolidate. The night was dark but he arrived safely and got his guns into position. Just at dawn he found that one was in a list of a trench just over the forward slope of the hill. By this time I had received orders to withdraw all guns to support another attack. This I ordered him to do, and it was during this withdrawal that your son was lost. One man was killed and two wounded, in trying to withdraw the gun, and rather than send any more men to such a dangerous job, your son endeavoured to do so himself and was instantaneously killed by a shot from an orange grove 200 yards away. He cannot have had an instant's pain as he was shot through the head without the slightest disfigurement. I could not realize that he had passed away, he looked so peaceful with his own happy smile on his face. He lies buried beside the men he commanded and loved, within the sound of the sea surf at Wadi Hesi, and near the orange groves of Herbiah."

E. H. Woodward (May 1911), Cadet, Royal Air Force.

A. B. Worrall (May 1900), Corporal,

Army Service Corps. Served in France over four years.

H. R. Worsley (Sept. 1904), 2nd Lt., Lancashire Fusiliers. Enlisted 1915 un West Kent Yeomanry. Was later commissioned to Lancs. Fusiliers. Mentioned in despatches. Killed in Action at Le Transloy, Sept. 1st, 1918. Now buried in Barncourt Cemetery.

T. G. Worthington (Sept. 1909), Captain, 10th South Wales Borderers. Killed and buried at Englefontaine Oct. 29th, 1918. On one occasion he and seven others were in a shell hole when a shell burst killing the other seven, but leaving him without a scratch.

L. G. Young (Sept. 1914), Lieut., 12th Sherwood Foresters. Wounded at Cambrai Oct. 15th, 1918.

Killed in Action and buried on 'the Hilt,' one mile west of Doiran, Sept. 18th, 1918. His Colonel wrote:—"Your son, Major Curtis, was killed gallantly leading his men against a very strong position held in considerable force by the Bulgars. I have always found your son to be a most conscientious man who worked very hard for the good of his regiment and country. Many other letters were received by Mr. and Mrs. Curtis.

H. Curtis, Lieut., 9th West Yorks. Regiment. Gazetted 2nd Lt., August 1914; Lieut. Jan. 1915. Reported 'Wounded and Missing' in Gallipoli

August 9th, 1915, and not heard of since. Lieut. Elliot wrote :- " I was with Curtis most of the day before he was killed. He was very cheery, laughing and joking the whole time. Next morning we were very heavily attacked, and it was during this attack that Lieut. Curtis was
